Participants over the last two years include a City Council member, a sci-fi convention, restaurants, church groups, pre-schools through high schools, vegan entrepreneurs, well-known animal protection organizations such as Farm Sanctuary and Compassion Over Killing, and friends who simply got together to give the public a chance to try tasty vegan baked goods.

Proceeds from bake sales have gone to river cleanup efforts, homeless shelters, anti-discrimination clinics, autism programs, breast cancer prevention, earthquake relief, local humane societies, vegan advocacy groups, and farm animal sanctuaries.
